

REACH 2.0 Program: Application Instructions and Information

This guide provides detailed information about the **REACH 2.0 Program** and is intended to assist you in completing your application. It includes important details about eligibility, program benefits, and required materials. Please review all sections carefully to ensure that your application is complete and meets the necessary criteria. REACH 2.0 Program Overview:

The **REACH 2.0 program** provides mentorship and leadership development to medical students, residents, and fellows in **Addiction Medicine (AM)** and **Addiction Psychiatry (AP)**.

The primary goals of the program are to:

1. Increase the knowledge of mental health and substance use disorder (SUD) providers in the prevention, diagnosis, treatment, and recovery support **vulnerable** individuals with a mental health disorder or SUD.
2. Increase the overall number of **racially just, culturally humble, and responsive addiction specialists who are representative of the people they serve** in the AP and AM workforce.
3. Increase the number of **racially just, culturally humble, and responsive addiction specialists** who are representative of the people they serve in the AP and AM workforce who **improve the quality of mental health, SUD prevention, and treatment for vulnerable groups**.

The **REACH 2.0 Program** is an immersive training experience for medical students, fellows, and residents from backgrounds that represent the various patients they serve and are interested in becoming leaders in addiction medicine and addiction psychiatry. The yearlong program provides education in evidenced-based culturally informed addiction health care practices. Funded through the Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration (SAMHSA) Minority Fellowship Program (MFP) for a total of 5 years, REACH 2.0 provides training and mentorship to 20 Scholars and 20 Near Peers every year.

Each year is known as a separate cohort. Scholars in yearly cohorts are paired with both a traditional REACH 2.0 mentor and a Near Peer Mentor. The traditional mentor, with many years of experience in Addiction Medicine (AM) or Addiction Psychiatry (AP), plays a conventional mentorship role. The Near Peer Mentor is a physician who has previously

participated in the REACH Program or a similar mentorship program and is slightly further along in their academic or professional journey than the more nascent REACH 2.0 Scholar.

Both the Near Peer and traditional mentor provide guidance, support, coaching, sponsorship, and mentorship, each bringing their unique experiences. Near Peer mentors offer a relatable perspective, having more recently navigated similar challenges and experiences. This dynamic triad fosters collaboration, shared learning, and mutual encouragement creating an environment that is both accessible and inspiring for the scholar.

Eligibility:

All applicants interested in the REACH 2.0 Scholar Program must meet the following criteria:

- Have a completed application submitted on or before the deadline
- Be individuals from diverse backgrounds, particularly those who have faced historical challenges or underrepresentation, or those who are open to working with and learning from people with diverse perspectives
- In medical school, residency training, or fellowship program as of July 1, 2025 and enrolled through June 2026

- A U.S. Citizen or Permanent Resident
- Willing to **commit** to:
 - Attend and participate in **monthly** virtual networking events (trainings, webinars, panel discussions, Health Liberation Sessions) throughout the program year
 - Attend the 3-day, in-person Welcome Intensive Workshop in July 2025. (Travel stipends are provided)
 - Attend at least one addiction conference over the course of the year (funding provided by the REACH 2.0 program)
 - Meeting virtually with an assigned Near Peer and Mentor at least one time per quarter.
 - Participate in program evaluation activities, including pre- and post-training surveys, mid-year/exit surveys and qualitative interviews,
 - Complete a Scholarly Project. (Stipends are provided for approved activities.)

Scholars will receive the following benefits:

- Intensive mentoring from Near Peers and a Mentor in Addiction Medicine or Addiction Psychiatry
- Meaningful engagement with cohort members and addiction medicine and addiction psychiatry practitioners
- Supportive and diverse network of practitioners from around the U.S. caring for individuals with SUD while driving change within healthcare systems
- \$40,000 annual stipend and travel reimbursement for approved activities (stipends provided through a SAMSHA grant to eligible participants)

Application Checklist/Attachments:

The following materials must be complete and attached to your application:

2. CV/Biosketch

3. Two Recommendation letters

- Please include **two** letters of recommendation from a current or recent supervisor, program director, or faculty member who can attest to your medical education, training, and experience. The letters of recommendation must speak to the applicant's clinical skills, commitment to serving vulnerable groups, and/or experience providing substance use disorder (SUD) services.
- Please ensure that the letter is signed by your recommender and that you provide their email address in the application. Please note that the recommender will be contacted to verify their letter of recommendation.
- The Letters of Recommendation must be attached to your application for consideration. If the recommender emails the letters to us, please note we can't attach it to your application.

4. Statement of Participation from supervisor or program director

- Note: This must be separate from the letter of recommendation, but you may ask the same person to do both a letter of recommendation and the statement of participation. Please ensure that the Statement of Participation is attached to your application for consideration.
